GTTP Jamaica students are all members of the Tourism Action Clubs, the voice of youth tourism in the country. In Jamaica, tourism is not taught as a subject in school and students in tertiary education who are interested in exploring more about tourism join a club. Guided by the Jamaica Tourist Board (JTB), students participate in a range of activities to build knowledge of the sector and its impact on nation building.

The first TAC was established at Excelsior High School in Kingston in 1995, and through the clubs, students can access the GTTP portal, enter national and international competitions, and have the opportunity to represent their country at the international student/teacher conference and events. Club activities are based on three pillars, education, community engagement and recreation, and clubs meet regularly at a national level via Tourism Youth Forums, Career Expos and International Coastal Cleanup Day activities.
